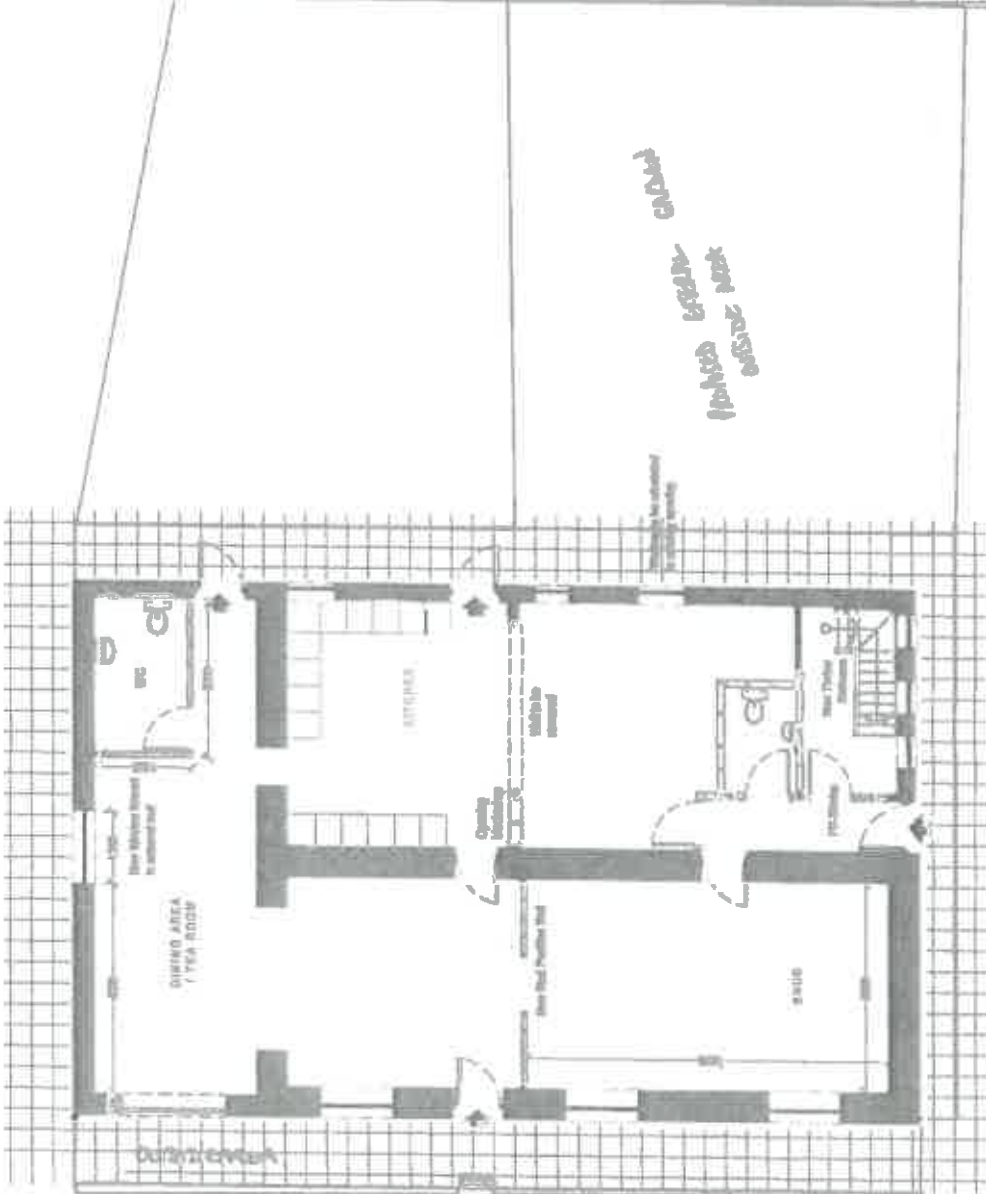

The Licensing Authority believes that the following sections of Carmarthenshire's Licensing Policy are relevant to this licence application:- Section 3 Fundamental principles, Section 4 Conditions of Licence, Sections 5 – 9 relating to The Licensing Objectives and Section 11 relating to Licensing Hours.

f) **Proposed Operating Schedule.**

Having considered the current application and the operating schedule put forward by the applicant, the Licensing Authority believes that, if the application were granted, the wording set out in the operating schedule, which refers to the existing licence conditions, is not sufficiently precise to enable it to form clear enforceable licence conditions in accordance with section 18(2)(a) of the Licensing Act.

Given the proximity of residential properties and that the application is seeking to permit the provision of Live and Recorded Music, Late Night Refreshment and the Sale of Alcohol until 1.00 am on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings as well as Bank Holidays and New Year's Eve, when the permitted hours stipulated under the previous licence for the majority of those activities was much earlier, the licensing authority requests that the applicant provide an assessment in accordance with paragraphs 5.1 – 5.5 of the Council's Licensing Policy (Copy Attached) The licensing authority believes that it would be appropriate for the assessment be provided in advance of the determination of the application in order that consideration may be given as to whether additional conditions should be attached to any licence granted.

As part of this assessment the applicant is requested to confirm the proposed internal layout of the premises and details of any external areas to be designated as consumption areas and smoking areas, along with any proposed control measures such as a terminal hour.

The licensing authority would ask the applicant to confirm in writing the current position in relation to planning permission for the premises and the steps taken to deal with any outstanding planning issues.

The Dyfed Powys Police have submitted a letter of representation in relation to the application which requests that additional conditions be attached to the licence should the application be granted.

Further representations have been received from other persons, which set out their concerns regarding the application. The subcommittee will have to be satisfied that granting the application will not undermine the licensing objectives.

If the application is granted, I believe it would be appropriate to replace all the statements made in the operating schedule with the conditions requested by

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the Police and any additional conditions that are appropriate following receipt and consideration of the applicant's assessment.

10. All footage must on demand be made available to a Police Officer, Police Community Support Officer and Local authority Officer for viewing and a copy of that footage made immediately available to the above officers.
11. At all times during the period of operation of the premises there must be a competent person on the premises capable of reply and be able to undertake the export of recordings quickly onto a removable storage medium. Memory Stick, CD, or DVD format is acceptable to the police. The master copy will be available to the police on demand.
12. The system must incorporate a means of transferring images from the hard-drive to a format that can be played back on any Microsoft Windows or MAC compatible computer. The application software required to launch and view recorded images must either be included as part of the standard operating system installed or be installed to the recorded media when the data is copied to that media.
- 13 The system must be registered with the Information Commissioner (Tel 0303 123 1113 or email registration@ico.org.uk)

Please refer to the Dyfed Powys Police CCTV requirement document for full specification. This can be accessed by contacting Pc. Rob Chapman at the Community Safety Office Ammanford Police Station telephone number 01269 590580 as a matter of urgency to discuss the above CCTV conditions prior to any agreement being reached. To ensure that any system installed complies with the requirements of the proposed licence conditions.

14. The applicant to risk assess the use of door supervisors whenever Regulated Entertainment is provided after 11pm.

The applicant to also risk assess the use of door supervisors at all other times for Regulated Entertainment, if provided before 11pm. especially on Bank Holiday weekends, Christmas Eve, Boxing Day and New Year's Eve and major televised sporting events.

The Licence Holder shall supply an appropriate number of Door Supervisors for the maximum occupancy for the premises and the appropriate number shall be 2 in respect of the first 100 persons and one for each additional 100 persons or part of 100 persons comprised in the maximum occupancy figure.

When employed Door Supervisors must be registered with the SIA, to be on duty

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until the time that all members of the public have left the premises.

Door Supervisors shall not be permitted to consume intoxicating liquor or other intoxicants during any period of duty at the Premises. A Door Supervisor shall report on duty in a sober condition.

The Designated Premises Supervisor or Premises Licence Holder shall nominate for each and every exit door a Door Supervisor who's duty it shall be to ensure that the exit door is opened immediately in the event of a Fire or other Emergency and if practicable no more than one door shall be designated to each Door Supervisor.

No Door Supervisors shall be engaged in any duty that would otherwise prevent him, carrying out his duty as a Door Supervisor or exercising general supervision and control of persons attending the Premises.

Door supervisors to remain on duty after Regulated Entertainment ends until permitted hours in respect of the supply of alcohol finishes.

As per paragraph 6.1 within the Licensing Policy.

15. No open glass or glass vessels to be removed from the boundary of the premises.
16. The DPS to become a member of the local Pub Watch scheme and to support the BOBB scheme, 'Behave or be Banned'.

As per paragraph 6.7 within the Licensing Policy

17. The challenge 21 scheme to be adopted at the premises with notices and posters to be clearly displayed in the premises, near the entrances and bar areas. To emphasise to customers that they will be challenged if they look 21 and under.
18. No person under the age of 18 shall be employed on the premises whether paid or unpaid for the purpose of serving alcohol.
19. The consumption of alcohol by customers at the premises must cease at or before the end of opening hours as specified in the premises licence. Staff are required to collect all alcoholic drinks prior to the end of the opening hours as set out in the licence.
20. That there is a terminal hour of 22.30 in any outside location within the boundaries of the premises, for the consumption of alcohol.

As per paragraph 6.4 within the Licensing Policy

21. No children under the age of 16 years to remain on the premises after 22:00 unless they are attending a pre-booked event or function and in the company of a parent or responsible adult.

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The above conditions the police believe are necessary and appropriate to promote the Licensing Objectives.

Further to the receipt of the above application, I would like to make the following representations on behalf of the Environmental Health Section of Carmarthenshire County Council.

I am aware that we do not have a history of "Public Nuisance" or "Public Safety" related complaints when the above was previously Licensed. Nevertheless I would like to make the following comments that are based on my professional opinion, experience from dealing with similar venues across the county and also the following factors relating to this application

- The nature of the application including the hours and activities applied for.
- The rural nature of the locality
- The proximity to residential properties
- The proposed operating schedule does not contain sufficient control measures.
- During discussions with the applicant there remains to be some uncertainty over the intended layout of the premises, especially key areas such as the customer smoking area.

Therefore I recommend that the applicant should undertake and submit a Risk Assessment (*as per paragraph 5.1 to 5.5 of Carmarthenshire County Council Licensing policy*). This is to enable for an informed decision to be reached on the above application, and whether any relevant conditions should be attached to the Premises Licence. This Risk Assessment should assess the potential impacts the above application may have on all of the Licensing Objectives especially the "Prevention of Public Nuisance" and "Public Safety" objectives.

To Whom it may concern.

We wish to make a strong objection to issuing of the licence application by Kim Miller of 126 Mountain Road for the licence to sell alcohol until 01.00hours and the playing of music with live bands.

This is very different to her suggestion of opening as tea rooms We have had bad experiences when number 126 was run as a Pub with closing times continually being ignored with drinking and loud music going on into the early hours of the morning when some people spilled out of the pub in intoxicated manner with young couples shouting and singing and arguing, waking up fearful residents who had to threaten to call the police. The pub doors were closed but it was the neighbours who suffered from the leaving customers behaviour.

The property has no parking area and as a result cars were parked on both sides of the road, across driveways and sometimes in driveways of residents with some cars left to be collected later in the day. This parking caused the road to be a single narrow one lane and became a danger to traffic and pedestrians.

Customers who had rung for taxis were summoned by the taxi driver tooting the car horn continually while he waited for those who had ordered him to come out of the pub. As a result of all this noise in the summer we could not leave our bedroom windows open at night.

Likewise when kiddies parties held on afternoons parents would park without consideration for residents by blocking their entrances.

With the non smoking laws customers would take their drinks outside in front of of the pub especially on warm days. The language and profanities were shocking making working and sitting out in our garden out of the question. Young children should not be subjected to this.

Often we had to collect beer cans and bottles which had been thrown over our boundary into our garden.

The people that the application would benefit will be the generation who crave for loud music and drink and keep late hours. Entertainment as such does not apply to hard working families who get up early for work and have young children to care for .

Rarely in our past experience have closing hours been adhered too.

To summarise our objections:

1The parking would not be in the public safety 2.The alcohol ,loud music and profanities would be a public nuisance 3.The weekends and bank holidays opening hours would encourage drinking resulting in possible criminal activities and public disorder.

4.The effect on toddlers in the neighbourhood would be detrimental and a big worry for their parents.

5.The value of all the properties in the area would depreciate.

We hope you will look favourably at our complaint, Thank you Mr D M Jones and Mrs T Jones.

I would like to object to the issuing of this licence. Having reviewed the Carmarthenshire country council Licensing Policy statement criteria, I believe the current proposal lacks adequate detail. Outlined in this documentation, the licensing authority has a duty to act with a view of promoting four licensing objectives. I feel the current application fails to fully fulfil said objectives on which my objection is based.

Kim Miller has informed me she desires to operate a tea room from the premises. The hours requested on this application do not represent the parameter I would expect a typical tea room to operate within. Living within proximity I feel the current proposed operation hours will cause significant disruption to my current residence. Furthermore, the fore mentioned premises is a residential premises and lacks planning permission to operate under the proposed premises licence.

I see no mention in the operating schedule measure taken to prevent customers removing glasses bottles/can of alcohol from the premises. I feel a lack of managing this could cause significant disruption during late hours whilst the premises is operational. This could also cause potential for littering issues as there could be glass bottles, cans of alcohol littering the road/smash on the road and surrounding areas, which would prove very dangerous as there are young children living within very close proximity of the premises and they could potentially play with the glass and injure themselves.

There is no outlined maximum capacity within the operational schedule or control measures to ensure its enforced. I would like to have greater understanding of this aspect of the proposed application due to the limitations of the location facilities. The premises has limited parking and is located on a busy main road, and therefore has limited space parking spaces for patrons. Patrons accessing the

premises using taxis could cause disruption during the late hours requested in this application (the tooting of horns to alert customers etc.) I would like to know how the applicant proposes to manage this part of the operation as furthermore with limited parking, how does the applicant propose to manage this? During late night, operating hours, how does the applicant propose customers accessing the property do not cause disturbance to neighbour's properties? I see no evidence of an adequate dispersal policy for the premises in the application.

There are no measures outlined to supervise customers within outside spaces. I feel these issues need to be adequately addressed. Consideration to how noise from external smoking shelters/areas are to be controlled is not detailed in the operational schedule. With residential dwellings surrounding this premises such activities could cause significant disruption during evening operational hours. In addition, the odour created from such activates could easily drift in to adjoining properties.

There is no outlined emergency evacuation plan in the operating schedule additionally with limited parking in the close vicinity over congested parking could hamper any access required by emergency services to the premises and additionally neighbouring properties. This issue should be addressed in an adequate risk assessment.

There is no detailed outlined delivery schedule for the premises which could potentially causes disturbance to the neighbouring properties if not adequality managed

Please could the applicant produce a detailed outlined closedown process of the premises including how glass bottles are disposed of.

There are no clear codes of conduct the applicant feels necessary to adopt when children are present in the premises. In addition, with several families within proximity of this premises this is important when considering uses of outdoor spaces such as smoking shelters.

Children are permitted on the premises until 22:00, this falls outside recommended hours during school nights. This falls short of policy recommendations.

In summary, based on current licencing policy, I believe the current premises licence application is unsuitable for the premises. The operation under such licence will have significant negative effect to myself and surrounding resident's properties. Kim Miller should have more stringent plans outlined before any licence is issued. The current premises are not suitable for the current application and lacks the relevant planning permission for said licence. Finally, the current application falls well outside the hours one would expect a typical tea room to operate in accordance with.

Thank you for forwarding the objection from Thomas Marr and the complaint from Mr and Mrs Jones.

Whilst I appreciate the concerns contained therein, I would like to advise you that since applying for the premises license I have neither been approached nor have I spoken with either of these parties (despite seeing both many times whilst at the property). I am happy to discuss plans with anyone and I have made no secret of my plans for the building. My front door has been open continually for anyone to call in and ask questions but other than a passing conversation when I first bought the building, I have not spoken in any detail to either party, although their letters to you appear to suggest otherwise.

I also find it rather frustrating that my application has received these objections, which in my opinion, appear to be based on personal preferences and possibilities, rather than any sound reasoning that the objectives of licensing will or cannot be met. Not that it is my business or relevant how the previous landlord ran their business but there is no evidence whatsoever from the police (or other authorities) that the licensing objectives were not adhered to in the past.

I purchased the building as a business venture in April, with both the then owner and the Council (Rating Dept.) advising me the building was registered as a 'tearoom' and it is still rated for non domestic rates as a 'Public House'. To address one of Mr Marrs' concerns, my understanding is that this application is not in any way related to 'building control' or 'planning' although I am in contact with Mr Francis, (who is on holiday at present) awaiting details of how to proceed in regard to reopening a business here.

I have been approached by many local residents who have asked me when I am to reopen The Black Mountain Inn in some capacity. One neighbour has even offered to gather signatures in favour of a licence and another has offered use of their car parking facilities, if required. I should add that neither of these people 'crave loud music or excessive drinking' and are as opposed to littering and antisocial behaviour as I am. Other local residents are looking for somewhere, within walking distance, to meet friends and relatives in comfortable, safe and relaxed surroundings.

Sentiment for the building itself is strong, having been a local meeting point and public house for at least the last 40 years. It is because of this and at the local peoples request that I made the application for the premises licence in the first instant. As interest in the tearoom and bar has grown

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In the last months, people have openly approached me for possible jobs. Others have clearly expressed views that this is an opportunity to develop an asset in Brynamman, improving tourism and provide local people, especially children and older residents with somewhere safe and welcoming, in a village in dire need of regeneration, with few facilities.

I realise the date has past for 'Representation', however, as Mr Marr's objection was delivered at the eleventh hour, I would welcome your recommendations on whether a list of signatories would help in anyway in furthering the application.

I am more than happy to put together finer details of how the licensing objectives can be met but as you are aware more serious concerns regarding recommendations and regulations are still awaited from several departments and are needed before I can provide a further detailed plan, to go forward with opening the business.

Thank you for your attention in this matter so far.

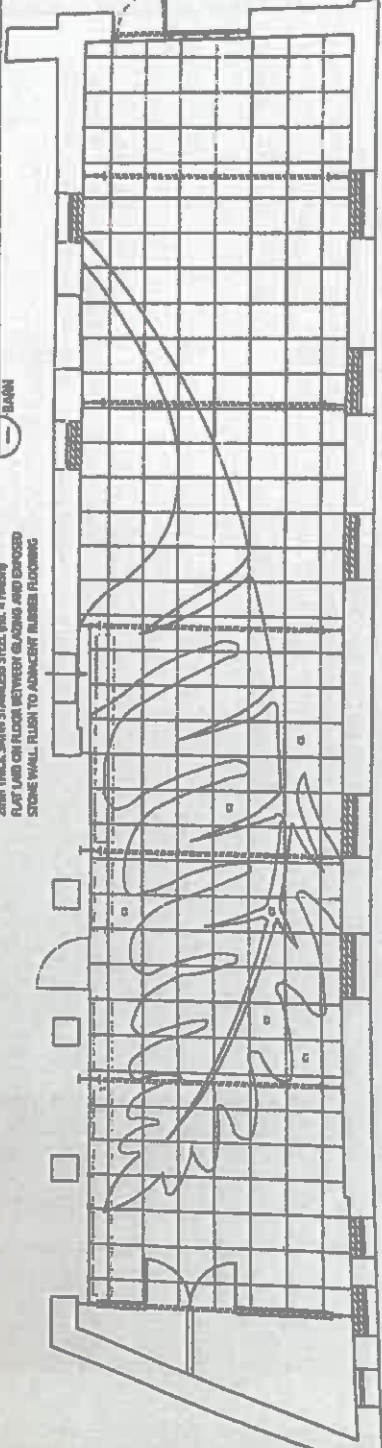


01 PROPOSED GROUND FLOOR PLAN

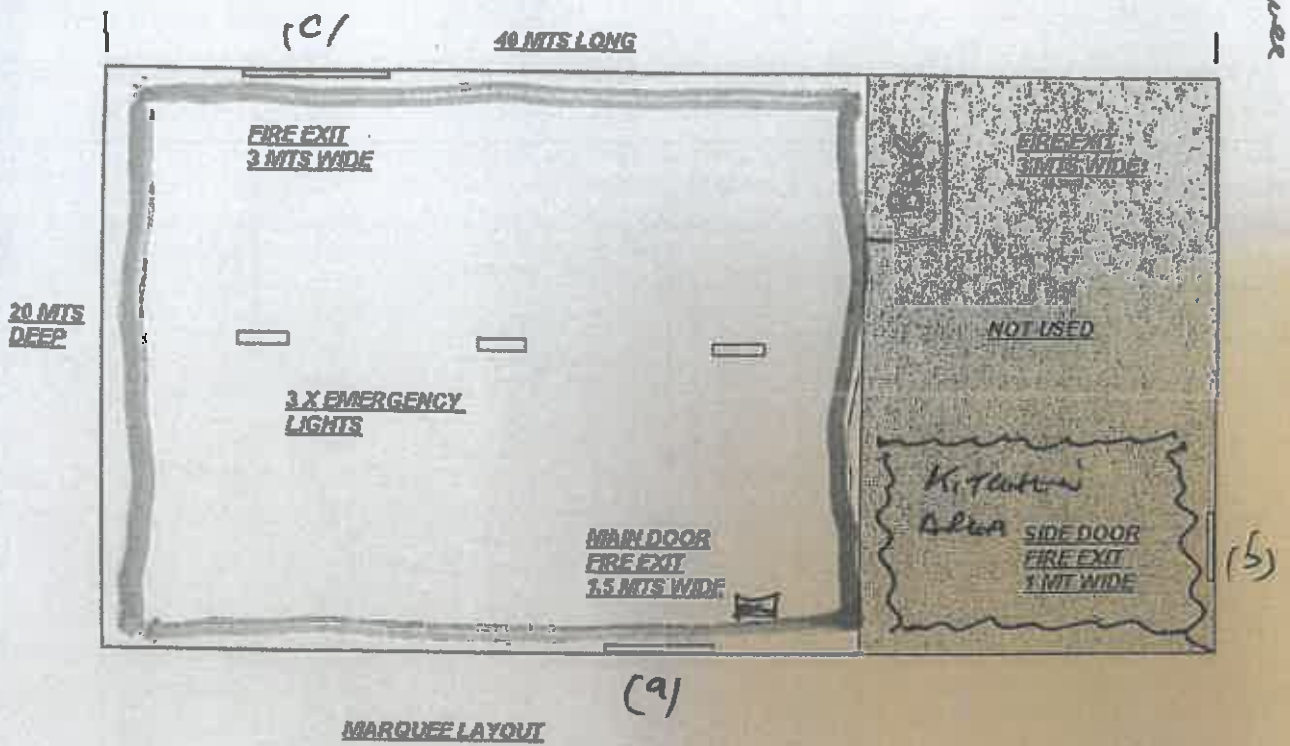



Ground Floor Plan

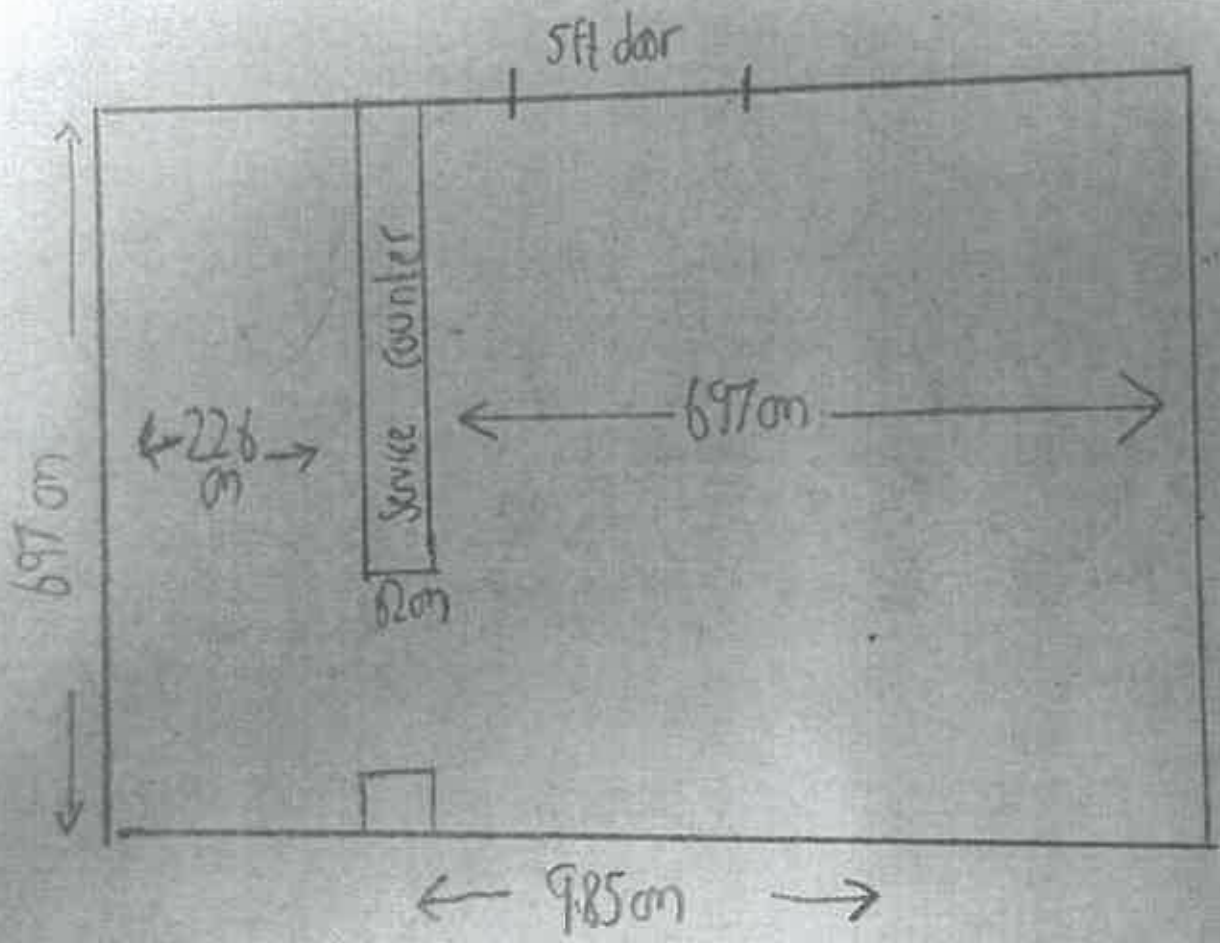

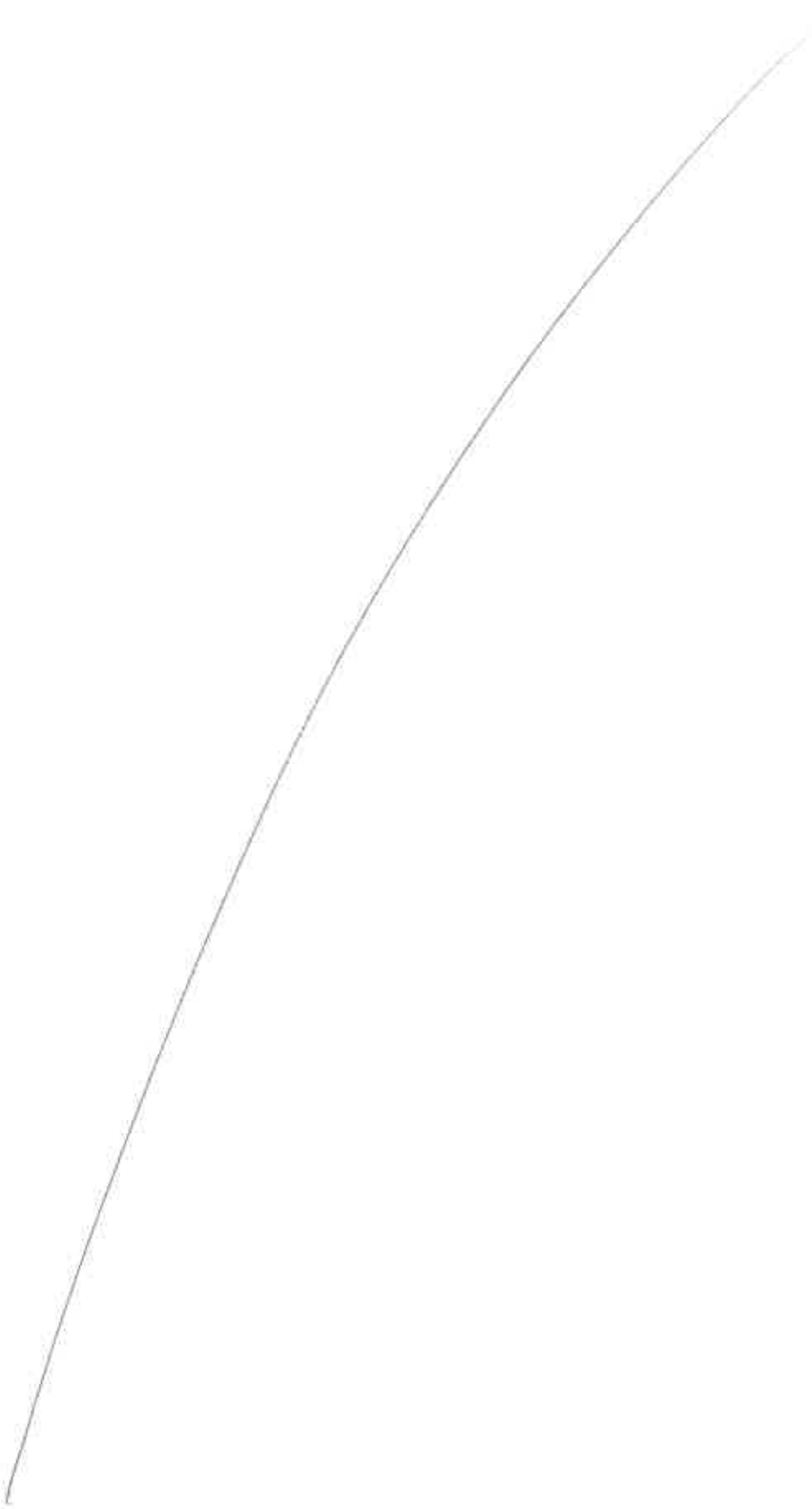

e) Relevant Sections of the Local Licensing Policy.

The Licensing Authority believes that the following sections of Carmarthenshire's Licensing Policy are relevant to this licence application:- Section 3 Fundamental principles, Section 4 Conditions of Licence, Sections 5 – 9 relating to The Licensing Objectives and Section 11 relating to Licensing Hours.

f) Proposed Operating Schedule.

Having considered the current application and the operating schedule put forward by the applicant, the Licensing Authority believes that, if the application were granted, the wording set out in the operating schedule, which refers to the existing licence conditions, is not sufficiently precise to enable it to form clear enforceable licence conditions in accordance with section 18(2)(a) of the Licensing Act .

From experience in dealing with licensing other large events and licensed venues and given the wide range of activities sought by the applicant , the requested permitted hours of operation and the large capacity of the premises within this rural location, the licensing authority believes that it would be appropriate to attach the following licence conditions to the premises licence, if granted:-

The Environmental Health representation outlines licence conditions which they believe are appropriate to attach to the licence if the application is granted. The licensing authority supports their request for the reasons outlined above, however I suggest that the condition requires the Event Management Plan to be approved in writing by the licensing authority following consultation with the Safety Advisory Group.

I would also suggest that the condition prohibiting licensing activities taking place without the above written approval be amended to clarify that it only applies to licensable activities forming part of events requiring an event management plan to be submitted.

The suggestion made by the Environmental Health Officer to identify an area where events with an audience capacity of 499 or less appears to be a sensible suggestion, that will allow smaller events to take place within the existing licensed areas without engaging the requirements for an event management plan.

In addition, for the same reasons as outlined above, the licensing authority would request the following additional licence condition :-

1. The licence holder shall give the licensing authority 14 days' notice of any event which includes licensable activity which is to take place in the open at any location within the licensed areas. This notice period can be reduced by agreement with the licensing authority in consultation with the Safety Advisory Group.

The Environmental Health officer has outlined the sorts of information that would be expected to be included within an Event Management Plan. For the applicant's information, I have attached two sample Event Management Plan templates to demonstrate the type of information and detail which would be considered appropriate for event organisers to provide.

The Dyfed Powys Police have also submitted a letter of representation in relation to the application. The Police representation requests that twenty two additional conditions be attached to the licence should the application be granted.

The licensing authority supports the Police request, however it believes that the authorities need to agree with the applicant the areas to be covered by the CCTV system sought by conditions 1-13.

Further representation has been received from other persons, which sets out their concerns regarding the application. The subcommittee will have to be satisfied that granting the application will not undermine the licensing objectives.

If the application is granted, I believe it would be appropriate to replace all the statements made in the operating schedule with the conditions requested by the responsible authorities.

These representations have been prepared on the 19th of September 2017 with the benefit of viewing the original application and the representations from the responsible authorities and other persons.

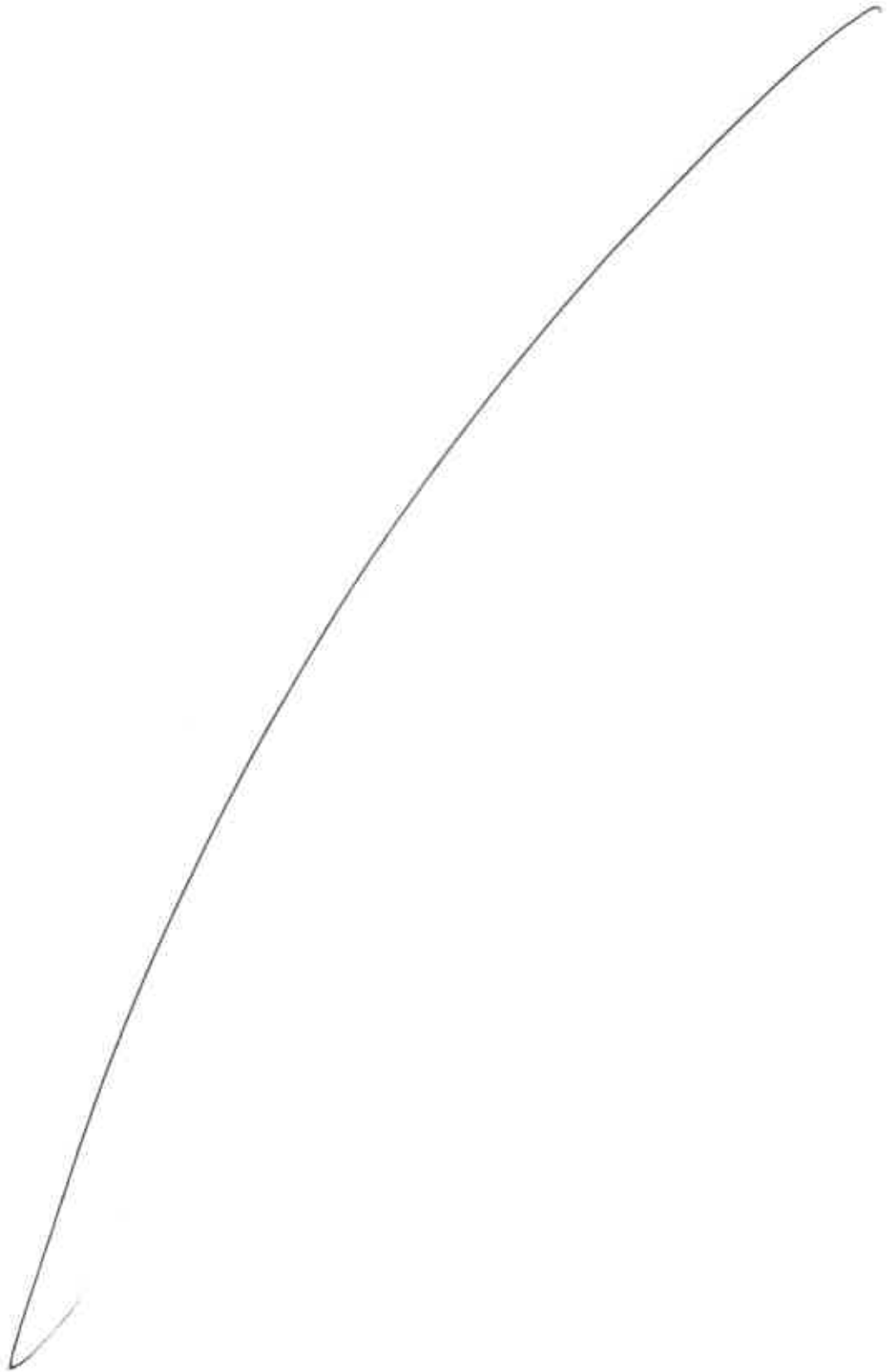

All area's and buildings within the boundary of the premises where the sale and supply of alcohol and Regulated Entertainment may take place, together with all entry and exit areas must be covered by CCTV cameras, and there must not be any hidden or obscured areas .This will deal with issues which may have arisen outside the premises when customers have been arriving or leaving.**
- 2. The System must be installed by a company certified by SSAIB or NSI Gold standard.**
- 3. Main entrance exit to have a camera meeting a minimum of 100%R image quality.**
- 4. All footage must be of good quality and of a minimum performance capability sufficient to identify individuals.**
- 5. It must be in colour.**
- 6. It must record at a minimum of 12 images per second.**
- 7. All images will be time and date stamped.**
- 8. All footage during the hours of Licensable activities to be retained for a period of 30 days.**

9. The CCTV system must operate continuously, and if a defect arises the police must be informed and immediate arrangements must be made to rectify the fault
10. All footage must on demand be made available to a Police Officer, Police Community Support Officer and Local authority Officer for viewing and a copy of that footage made immediately available to the above officers.
11. At all times during the period of operation of the premises there must be a competent person on the premises capable of reply and be able to undertake the export of recordings quickly onto a removable storage medium. Memory Stick, CD, or DVD format is acceptable to the police. The master copy will be available to the police on demand.
12. The system must incorporate a means of transferring images from the Hard-drive to a format that can be played back on any Microsoft Windows or MAC compatible computer. The application software required to launch and view recorded images must either be included as part of the standard operating system installed or be installed to the recorded media when the data is copied to that media.
13. The system must be registered with the Information Commissioner (Tel 0303 123 1113 or email registration@ico.org.uk)

Please refer to the Dyfed Powys Police CCTV requirement document for full specification. This can be accessed by contacting Pc. Rob Chapman at the Community Safety Office Ammanford Police Station telephone number 01269 590580 as a matter of urgency to discuss the above CCTV conditions prior to any agreement being reached. To ensure that any system installed complies with the requirements of the proposed licence conditions.

14. The applicant to risk assess the use of door supervisors whenever Regulated Entertainment is provided after 11pm.

The applicant to also risk assess the use of door supervisors at all other times for Regulated Entertainment, if provided before 11pm. especially on Bank Holiday weekends, Christmas Eve, Boxing Day and New Year's Eve and major televised sporting events.

The Licence Holder shall supply an appropriate number of Door Supervisors for the maximum occupancy for the premises and the appropriate number shall be 2 in respect of the first 100 persons and one for each additional 100 persons or part of 100 persons comprised in the maximum occupancy figure.

When employed Door Supervisors must be registered with the SIA, to be on duty until the time that all members of the public have left the premises.

Door Supervisors shall not be permitted to consume intoxicating liquor or other Intoxicants during any period of duty at the Premises. A Door Supervisor shall report

on duty in a sober condition.

The Designated Premises Supervisor or Premises Licence Holder shall nominate for each and every exit door a Door Supervisor who's duty it shall be to ensure that the exit door is opened immediately in the event of a Fire or other Emergency and if practicable no more than one door shall be designated to each Door Supervisor.

No Door Supervisors shall be engaged in any duty that would otherwise prevent him, carrying out his duty as a Door Supervisor or exercising general supervision and control of persons attending the Premises.

Door supervisors to remain on duty after Regulated Entertainment ends until permitted hours in respect of the supply of alcohol finishes.

As per paragraph 6.1 within the Licensing Policy.

15. No open glass or glass vessels to be removed from the boundary of the premises.
16. The DPS to become a member of the local Pub Watch scheme and to support the BOBB scheme, 'Behave or be Banned'.

As per paragraph 6.7 within the Licensing Policy

17. The challenge 21 scheme to be adopted at the premises with notices and posters to be clearly displayed in the premises, near the entrances and bar areas. To emphasise to customers that they will be challenged if they look 21 and under.
18. No person under the age of 18 shall be employed on the premises whether paid or unpaid for the purpose of serving alcohol.
19. That there is a terminal hour of 23.00 in any outside location, to include any Temporary structures within the boundaries of the premises for the sale of alcohol and a terminal hour of 23.30 for the consumption of alcohol. This does not include the marquee.

22. A 30 minute period to allow for 'drinking up' at 01.00hrs when the sale and supply of alcohol ceases. Staff are required to collect all alcoholic drinks prior to the end of drinking up time.

The above conditions the police believe are necessary and appropriate to promote the Licensing Objectives.

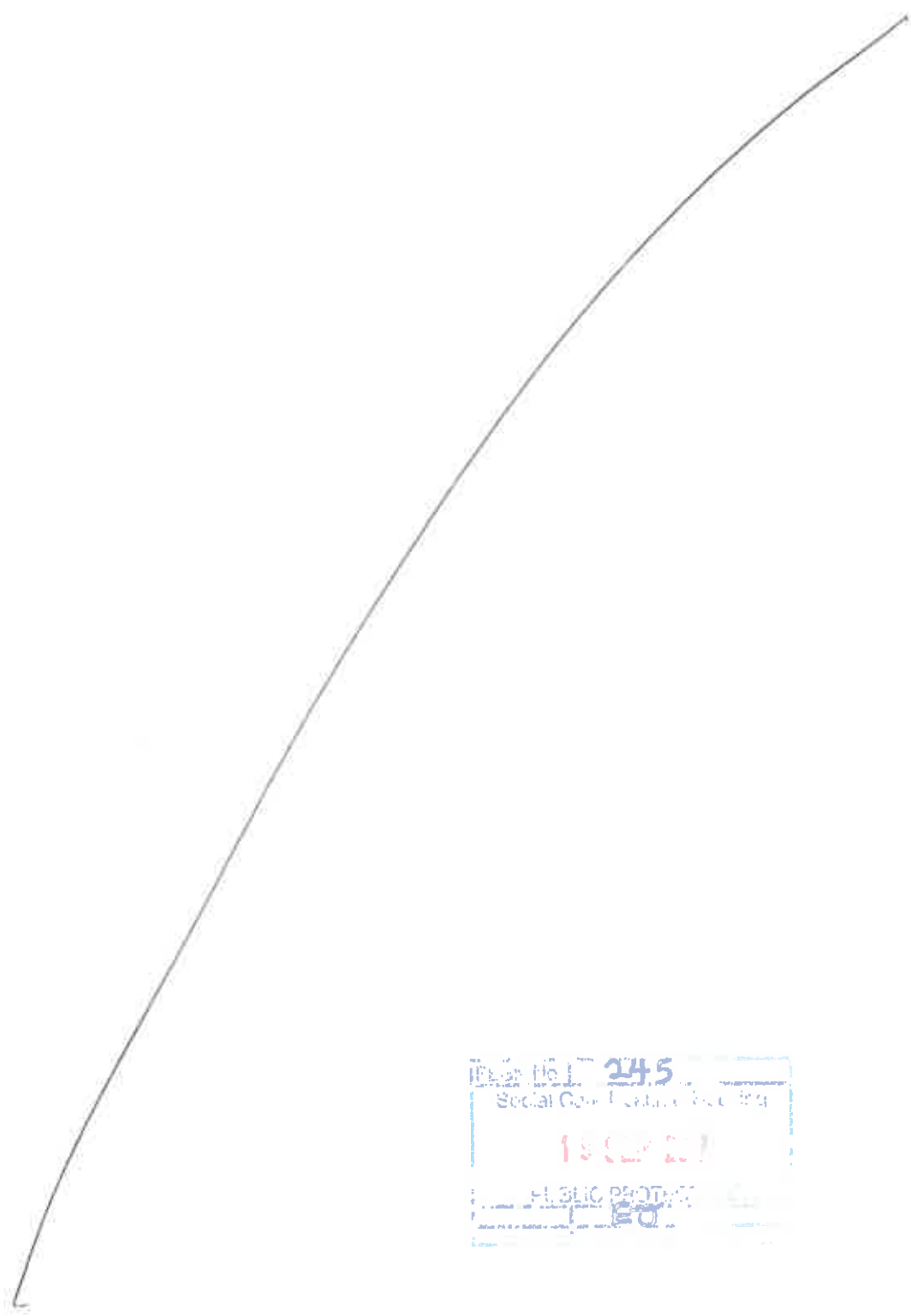

2. The Premises Licence Holder shall obtain the written approval of the EMP from the Licensing Authority at least 7 days prior to the event. No licensable activity may take place at the premises unless written approval has been received.

3. The Premises Licence Holder shall arrange for all relevant Certificates, Inspection Reports and Images to be available on site for the duration of the event and stored for a minimum of 31 days after the event.
4. The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that each Event Management Plan is effectively implemented during the event and monitored to ensure compliance with the Plan.
5. For Outdoor Music Concerts (including those held in temporary structures e.g. marquees) the specified Music Noise Levels shall not exceed those stipulated in Table 1 of the "Code of Practice of Environmental Noise Control at Concerts", when measured at 1 meter from the façade of any noise sensitive property during the event.
6. Prior to each outdoor music concert a noise management plan shall be developed in accordance with the "Code of Practice of Environmental Noise Control at Concerts" and shall be submitted to and agreed with the Licensing Authority at least 21 days prior to the event date.

For information the EMP submitted to the Environmental Health and Licensing Section for approval will be expected to outline all aspects of the event and responsibilities of the Premises Licence Holder.

- Traffic management Plan
- Car parking Plan
- Security and Stewarding Schedules outlining the number of SIA and non-SIA staff and locations

- Access routes for emergency vehicles in and out of the site
- Major Incident and Evacuation plan - in the event of an emergency
- Noise management Plan
- A list of all traders
- Health and safety
- First aid
- Fire safety Plan
- A detailed site plan(s) clearly indicating the position of the following;
 - Site boundary, entrances and exits to the site
 - All road and track ways (including emergency routes), car parks and other vehicles compounds;
 - The location of all structures either constructed or brought onto site
 - The location of the campsite (if appropriate)
 - The location of toilet, shower (if appropriate) and washing facilities
 - Drinking water points and associated pipe work including sampling points and soak ways



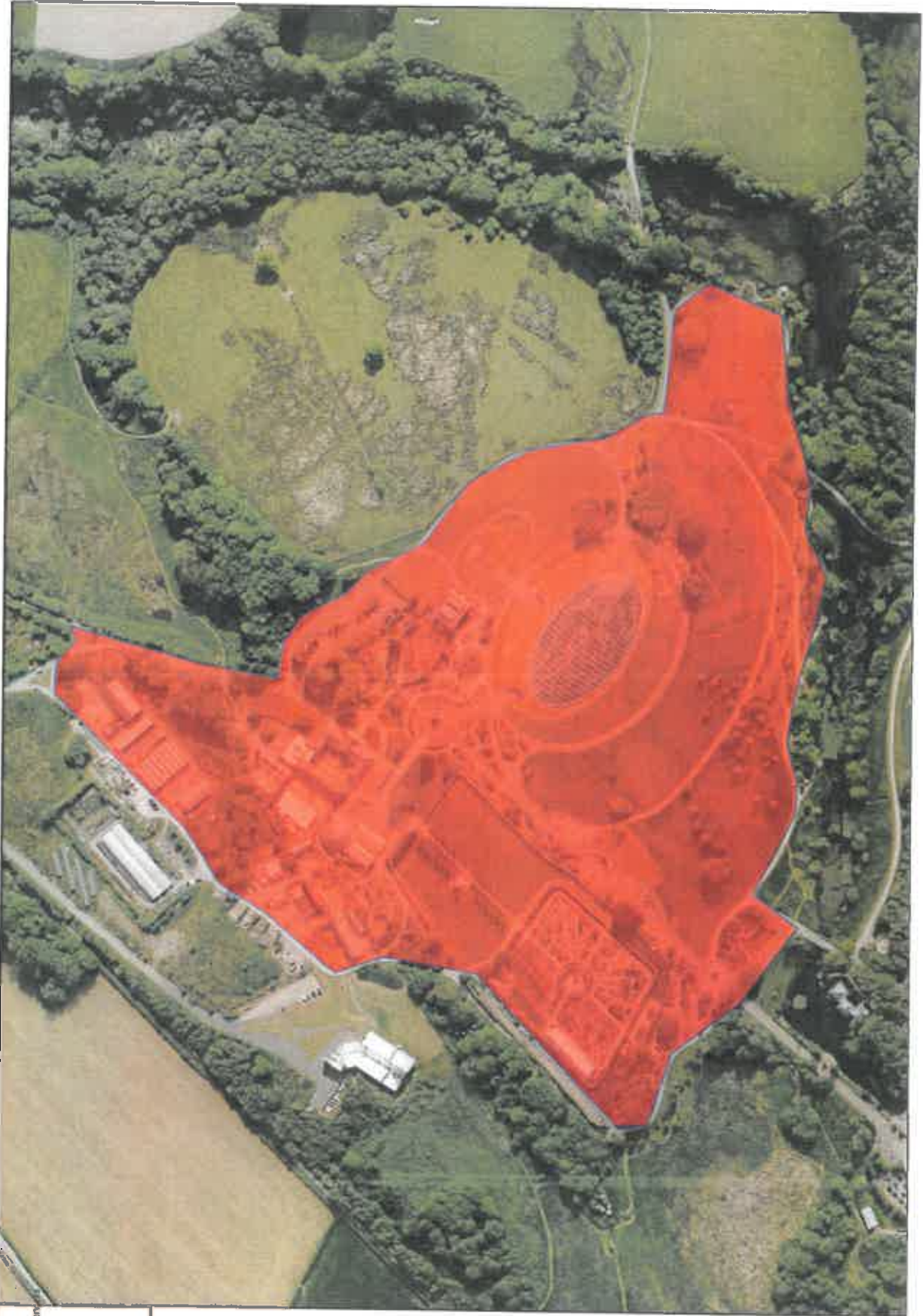

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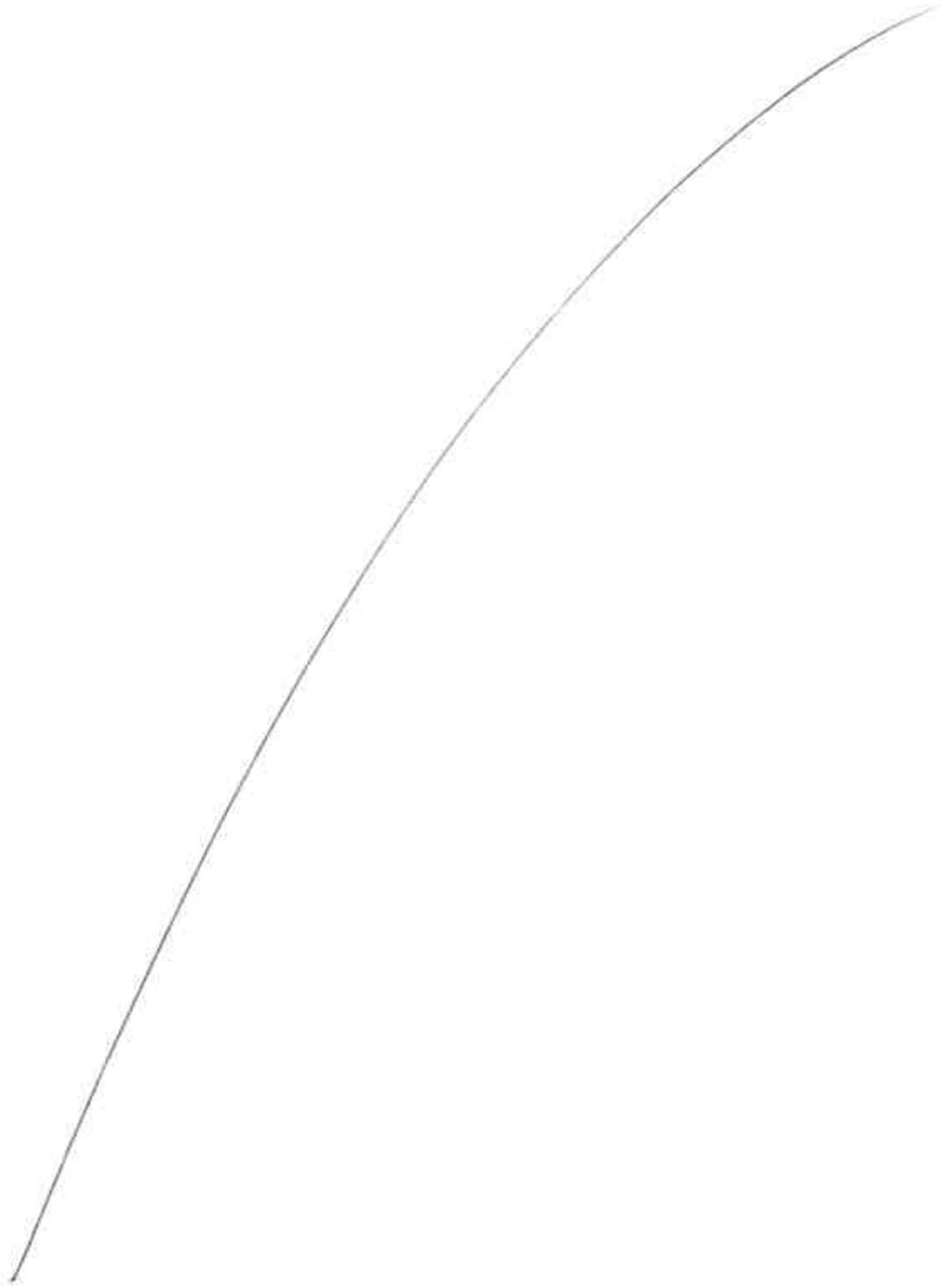

Dear Ms Smith:

Thank you very much for speaking to me this morning. This is to serve as my objection to the potential approval of the licensing application submitted by the National Botanic Garden of Wales for extended supply of alcohol hours; extended live music hours; extended late night refreshment hours; and extended holding of drama, films, indoor sports, boxing/wrestling, and performance of dance.

I live in the vicinity of the National Botanic Garden of Wales, and my wife and I moved here in great part to enjoy the peace and quiet of the countryside. We have long supported the Botanic Gardens, and are Life Members.

However, we are concerned that an extension of licensing hours, particularly in conjunction with the current planning efforts to construct hard-standing pitches for motorhomes, tent pitches, and timber-cladded wigwam cabins – and the resulting increase in numbers of visitors at the edges of the Botanic Gardens – will change the dynamic of both the National Botanic Garden and its surrounding areas.

My objections to the granting of this application fall under three of the licensing objectives of the licensing authority:

1. The prevention of public nuisance. An extension of the license will encourage more events that will be louder and continue later than previously. This would cause considerable disturbance to both local residents and their stock animals, as well as to visitors to local holiday homes. This would be exacerbated by the noise of traffic associated with the arrival and departure of people to these events. In the past, I have been able to hear events at the Botanic Gardens, and this should not be increased by frequency or duration.

2. Protection of children from harm. There are a number of houses along the small lanes that run near the back of the Botanic Gardens. Events held at the Botanic Gardens will increase the traffic (particularly that of individuals unfamiliar with the area) and therefore will create unnecessary danger to children.

3. Public safety. There is a danger to local residents, their pets, and their stock animals due to the potential for increased traffic going to and leaving from the Botanic Gardens on small lanes. People leaving the back entrance to the Botanic Gardens already drive at unsafe speeds down local lanes, and the potential for accidents would be greatly increased by the late sales of alcohol at the Botanic Gardens.

Thank you very much for considering this letter and its points. I have attached this objection as well, in case it is easier for you to reproduce it that way.

I would be most grateful if you could acknowledge receipt of this email, so that I know it has been received in time.

Dear Ms Smith,

I write with reference to the application for extended licensing mentioned above. My objections to allowing the extension fall into three categories.

1. Public nuisance: the extended hours will cause considerable disturbance to local residents. Events continuing until one in the morning on all days of the week are unacceptable, and will cause distress, aggravation and loss of sleep. There will also be increased traffic noise from visitors arriving and leaving the events -- and who wants cars roaring past their homes in the small hours of the morning? The licence also wants the freedom to host a range of different events, some of which will be noisy and will attract large numbers of people. This will disturb local residents and those people who are staying in a number of local holiday homes.

2. Protection of children: the increased traffic along small rural lanes (there is currently an application for cabins, tents and caravans near the back gates of the Gardens, which will necessitate the use of these lanes) will cause risk to small children who play in the gardens off these lanes.

3. Public safety: there is also a risk to local residents from the increased volume of traffic on local roads. One neighbour has lost a cat to speeding cars, and I have also witnessed near misses with those local residents who walk their dogs. The area has also seen a huge increase in cycling over the last five years. More cars attending late events pose a risk to them.

I am writing about the application to extend the licence for holding events in the National Botanic Garden of Wales. I have lived in the area for more than 15 years, and have already noticed a steady increase in noise and traffic from the Gardens in that time. I am very concerned that the licence will allow a significant increase in frequency and lateness of noise, and will disturb not only me and my family, but the visitors/customers who stay in my holiday cottage. Such a public nuisance is highly undesirable.

We write as current members of the National Botanic Garden of Wales and as local residents with a property that includes a holiday cottage located within one mile of the NBGW rear hospitality entrance.

We are enthusiastic advocates and supporters of the gardens located as it is within the tranquil Towy Valley. We fully understand that the National Botanic Garden of Wales must be a viable and thriving business and support the initiatives to increase visitor footfall. However we wish to object strongly in respect of the licencing objective of 'Prevention of Public Nuisance' namely the application to have:

Live and recorded music Mon to Sun 8am – 1am, Alcohol Mon to Sun 8am – 1am and Hot food and Non- alcoholic drinks/late night refreshment again until 1am

The NBGW currently holds occasional weekend events which are tolerated in terms of noise pollution and in the interest of the Garden's revenue, participation and community interest. The consumption of alcohol is minimal and not necessary to the enjoyment of such occasions. The playing of live music, recorded music and late night drinking during the week and weekend would not be in the community interest and has the potential to seriously impact on the reason so many people seek to visit and live in the area, to experience peace and tranquillity within a beautiful setting.

Local hostelrys and premises such as Llanarthne Hall which occasionally uses a licence for community and fund raising purposes, stop serving at an appropriate time and we see no reason for the NBGW not to comply with the same licencing regulations imposed at weekends and during the week.

There is strength of feeling in Llanarthne and the surrounding area against Live and Recorded music and late night/ early morning alcohol consumption and we do hope that in the interests of Prevention of Public Nuisance that the premises licence will be restricted and with conditions commensurate with the best interests of the community as a whole.

Objection to the Application for a Premises Licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 by the National Botanical Garden of Wales.

According to the entry in Wikipedia, the National Botanical Garden of Wales (the Gardens) consists of 568 acres. Judging by the appearance of numerous signs, this appears to be the area of extent that the applicant wishes to consider as being licensed for the range of activities for which they have applied.

Irrespective of whether the whole of this area or a slightly reduced area is to be the subject of the application, it also appears that, if granted, this will be one of the largest areas of land provided with such a licence in England and Wales. The Council Licensing Committee should therefore be aware that, by whatever measure, we are dealing with an immense area, relative to other such applicants, for example public houses, village halls or even such as football stadia and concert venues. It is almost three square kilometres in extent. Agreement to this application in principle could set an outstanding precedent. I would suggest from the outset that an application of this sort is unreasonably large in concept.

The sheer size of the area in question, along with the diverse geography will introduce a need to address virtually whole new concepts of dealing with the need to meet the four main Licensing Objectives.

- a. How can the Gardens patrol and police such an area with qualified and experienced staff to prevent occurrences of crime and disorder? Do they intend to contract a sizeable security firm to control this area during normal and particularly special events, or their own paid steward force, or are they going to depend on a few volunteer stewards walking around with every good intention of dealing with matters by luck or judgement? The history of the Gardens so far strongly suggests that it will be the latter option they have in mind and will follow, rather than one of the more correct and appropriate first two.
- b. Likewise, within such a vast area how are they intending to ensure public safety? By means of professionals employed to prevent drunk patrons falling off dams wandering into lakes streams and bogs, or by the same group of casual stewards mentioned above? What will the Fire and Rescue Service say about having to potentially access 568 acres, some of which undoubtedly

has less than adequate road access. How will the police cope similarly if there is a major incident? Will the Gardens have dedicated all-wheel drive vehicles such as Pinzgauers on site to deal with incidents/emergencies?

c. I suggest similar concerns will extend in this context to matters of public nuisance and even the potential for the protection of children. Is the whole area of the Gardens proposed licensing area surrounded by a full security fence, with associated CCTV installations as is demanded of many other licensed premises?

d. The wide extent of the application in every respect suggests that the aim is to attract visitors in larger numbers than at present visit the gardens, as indeed is the current extent of car parking areas. Whilst it is possible in the future that many of these visitors, suitably fortified by alcohol, will go straight on to the A48 to continue their way to their various destinations, it is likely that a substantial proportion will debouch onto the various minor roads in the vicinity of the gardens. What steps will the Gardens take to deal with this potential public problem? Will they do nothing? Will they employ and pay for special police patrols to deal with potential offenders against the Drink and Driving legislation; or will they perhaps consider their public duty fulfilled by the provision of a few notices displayed in the areas in which they intend to sell alcohol within the Gardens? They will end up with many notices all over the place if they do even this conscientiously.

e. Other provisions in the application deal with public entertainment of various sorts. In particular that of music. Music, in outdoor settings, implies various degrees of amplification. From time to time the Gardens has already mounted some such outside events. I suspect that they may have not been aware of the extent that the music will carry, via the prevailing winds. The prevailing winds through the Gardens are very frequently from the south west. These carry the volume of sound through the relatively narrow valley of the Afon Gwynon to and through the village of Llanarthne itself. Many people in Llanarthne are perhaps too polite to complain about this but it could present a serious problem of noise pollution. Possibly a few outdoor concerts a year might not be objectionable but the clear intent behind this application is to increase the frequency and no doubt duration of such events until the early hours in a normally very quiet rural area. How much regard would be really paid to the views of the people within the noise envelope and what steps have the Gardens taken in the past to consult on, or minimise this? Moreover, if their application is successful, what steps would they take in future?

f. As a resident of Llanarthne, rather closer than most to the Gardens, I am completely unaware of any public consultations launched by the Gardens before the launching of this application, other than the multitude of blue notices scattered around the area. This does not appear to be good public relations on their part and rather smacks of *lesse-majeste*.

g. I feel that it is also highly relevant for the Licensing Committee to inquire what the Gardens has done to consult or research with other similar

businesses in the immediate area, as to the real effect on their trade. I am thinking here of the likes of Old Emlyn Arms pub, Wrights Restarant, the Polyn, the Prince of Wales pub in Porthyrhyd and even the village halls such as Llanddarrog and Llanarthne. Let alone the wider area. Is this development by the Gardens going to affect them adversely? I would assume here that regardless of what the Gardens may say on this, they are looking to increase their trade rather than simply share it out in a sort of egalitarian way. So many licensed premises in the area have closed in recent years or are clearly under threat. Will this application exacerbate or reverse this trend?

h. Does this proposed development by the Gardens mean that they will increase the already woefully small numbers of paid full and part time employees that they have, rather than just increase their need and dependency on volunteers? Will the effects they have on other businesses thereby diminish the number of paid employment in the area. What real benefits to the immediate area will this presumably increased traffic to the Gardens bring, as opposed to more road traffic clogging up already narrow busy roads. Whilst some of these issues might be outside the strict prerogative of the Licensing Committee, they most certainly will not be outside the remit of the full Council.

j. I am worried that the Gardens have now, or will have full and complete planning consents in place for 568 acres or so of drinking, dancing, boxing and music etc. Whilst they may have consents for some or all of these activities in some or all of their buildings, do these consents really extend to the use of woodland and agricultural land, Pantwgan Farm, for example? Where will smoking be permitted or not be permitted, to mention just one issue?

k. Finally, the actual hours being applied for under all categories seem unduly long. Seventeen hours a day of music and alcohol sale seven days a week is a lot to expect a small community (765 souls in the 2011 census for Llanarthne and 1198 for Llanddarrog) to absorb. Whilst the applicants may protest that these hours may only be exercised exceptionally, the fact remains that they want the ability to exercise them and will not be restrained by very much if they decide to do so. It will almost be complete self-interested self-regulation! Rather like the potential provisions of the Great Repeal Bill currently before the English Westminster Parliament perhaps.
