

Comments include: Parents, grandparents and guardians also benefit from the sessions by learning about nutrition, healthy lifestyles, encouraging literacy and numeracy skills through the medium of storytelling.

This project will help to address the issue of obesity levels in Carmarthenshire which are very high, through a greater understanding of the importance of making healthy meals at home, will be more likely to buy healthy foods and cook cheap nutritious meals leading to a healthier lifestyle.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement

We have piloted a number of sessions in the Gwendraeth Valley and Llanelli areas and feedback received from parents and community groups has been very positive and through this exercise feedback has been collated from evaluation sheets, which confirms the support and need for this extended project.

Feedback has shown that by increasing the number of sessions from six to twelve and extending the age range from 0 - 3 to 0 - 7 years of age, there is a greater likelihood of everlasting changes for both the individual and the family.

role in supporting charitable causes, it has also found time to compete in Eisteddfodau and was successful in winning the primary award in its class at the Swansea National Eisteddfod.

The choristers, the majority of whom have Welsh as their first language, are amateurs and represent a good cross section of occupations and professions. Their unifying factor is their love of singing.

In furtherance of the choir's aims and objectives they have been invited to attend the 50th Anniversary Concert of the Dublin Welsh Male Voice Choir at the National Concert Hall, Dublin in September 2016. The Concert programme includes songs in the English, Irish and Welsh language and will serve to heighten Welsh Culture.

Carmarthen Male Voice will celebrate their 60th Anniversary in 2018 and the visit to Dublin will cement relationships with a view of a reciprocal visit to Carmarthen for the Anniversary Choir. This will serve to further enhance local economy and culture.

Such prestigious events always assist in recruiting members, regardless of nationality. The present membership includes people from England, Spain and Bermuda and assists incomers to be immersed in the Welsh language and traditions. This in turn leads to a significant community benefit with concerts being held in a wide variety of venues including, Village Halls, Old People's Homes, Town centres as well as more prestigious concert venues.

Choir members are anxious to widen their choral experience and assist in the cycle of continued improvement.

J Evans in 1847, but completely rebuilt under his successor the Rev. W E Evans in 1884. Soon after the rebuilding a vestry was added at the left southwest side.

	It is proposed to strip the defective slate roof coverings and replace with new Welsh slate over treated softwood battens and under felt, conduct repairs and woodworm treatment to the underlying roof structure, replace the lead sheet gutter and supporting timber boarding below with new treated timber boarding and weatherproof with sheet lead over fleece membrane and provide new cast iron rainwater pipes and gutter outlet boxes.

Sometimes other members of the choir speak and on
	perform are unable to provide staging or similar. To provide the choir with a portable PA System. The MD

is able to project their voice to the back of the hall. If the choir have guest soloists they sometimes require amplification and many venues are unable to provide this or charge us to hire. A portable public address system with a microphone would enable them to provide their own amplification. Cor Persain are available to participate in any community event, and in the immediate vicinity of Ammanford the choir has participated in St. Edmund's Church Centenary Celebrations, Ammanford Town Centre's St. David's Day celebrations, Rotary's Christmas Concert fundraiser, Ammanford Lions Club's Tree of Light Fundraiser, Concert in Aman Civic Centre on behalf of Marie Curie Cancer Care for example. The choir provides **Recreation** for local ladies and membership of the choir is open to any interested party and the choir's philosophy is that music making should be fun. The choir provides fun events for members and others when organising fundraising activities, which include quiz nights, karaoke night and craft sales.

Research into singing has shown it is good for your **Health** and particularly for your heart and general well being. Professor Graham Welch, Chair of Music Education at the Institute of Education, University of London, has studied developmental and medical aspects of singing for 30 years and he says the health benefits of singing are both physical and psychological. He says "Singing has physical benefits because it is an aerobic activity that increases oxygenation in the blood stream and exercises major muscle groups in the upper body, even when sitting. 	Eiriol does offer a home visit service but this is necessarily very limited both in terms of the advocate's time and travelling costs incurred. This project is to establish a base in Ammanford to provide an in depth one to one advocacy service in an accessible location. The office would allow advocates on their 3 current projects which are, 50+ mental health advocacy, mental health carers advocacy and generic community mental health advocacy, enabling clients to access the service in their community.
	There will be a dedicated project worker who would assist the advocates with client admin and liaise with clients and be a permanent point of contact for the project. The project will help the wider community by providing a

	service that not only supports those with mental health issues and their carers but also raises awareness of a problem that is still widely stigmatised and feared. It will enable a very vulnerable group of people who live in the area to access the support that will assist them in taking control of their lives and work towards recovery.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	There are over 178,000 residents in Carmarthenshire, 28,000 of whom live within the Mynydd y Betws Wind Farm fund wards which is 15%. As 1 in 4 people suffer with mental health issues at some point in their lives and many more are affected by becoming carers for these people, the need for advocacy in these areas is significant. Indeed this is supported by figures which show on average around 12% of Eiriol's caseload is made up by clients from this area, 350 clients in 2015 = 42 clients. This is a disproportionate amount and may be due to the deprivation status of the area. The WIMD also shows that Ammanford is within the top 10% areas of deprivation for healthcare in Wales and poverty is generally accepted to be both a consequence and determinant of poor mental health. Ammanford town contains the Swn y Gwynt day hospital for mental health, which means that it is a suitable location to engage with clients, who also attend this facility from across the region. It is also the base for HAFAL, a mental health recovery charity, whose work compliments but does not overlap with the advocacy support provided by Eiriol.

Contributing to the Education/Health - Advocacy helps people voice their themes of the Fund opinions, so their thought and wishes are heard and can be taken into consideration by others. This is especially important for those with mental health issues and their careers as the nature of the problem often means they become isolated, disengaged with services and feel unable to speak for themselves. The project will not only support people to resolve their current issues but also to develop self-advocacy skills to deal with similar issues in the future, overall improving their outlook and their future lives. This will also be a service they can access in their local community.
