Project Description	<p>The Home Gardening Project will provide volunteers with a space where they can learn about improving their all-round general wellbeing by growing healthy and nutritious food.</p> <p>The aim of the project is to encourage people to start growing their own food and provide members of the community with fresh food. Volunteers will also learn how to preserve food to make it last longer.</p> <p>Project coordinators understand that foodbanks are only temporary measures when it comes to combatting Food Poverty, which is why they are looking at other solutions such as grow your own.</p> <p>A specific plot of land is available for volunteers to learn about growing food together with the space to run sessions for members of the community and local organisations.</p> <p>The fund will help to part fund a project officer for a period 12 months who will be responsible for recruiting and training volunteers in aspects of growing. The purchase of a range of equipment, to include storage apparatus, compost, plants, and general consumables.</p>

Project Description	<p>During the current pandemic the Centre has been running a Help Llandovery Facebook page and enlisted over 70 volunteers to deliver groceries, prescriptions, post mail, etc. They have also been running a much-needed foodbank which has help to support many families in need. This has meant we have a greater understanding of the needs of the local community and this project would aim to meet some of those needs in respect of food poverty.</p> <p>A demonstration of the food poverty situation in Llandovery is that over the last 12 months the foodbank at the LYCC has supported an average of 98 people each week. The Centre also acts as a receiving point for people to collect their purchases of food boxes at reduced prices from the CBSA.</p> <p>The Community Centre has a garden area to the rear of the building with a workshop and beehive. Volunteers tend the garden, but the group would like to run specific courses for vegetable gardening/cookery for members of the local community. They have included dual-fruit trees in this application so that people can see how it is possible to produce fruit in very small spaces.</p> <p>The garden area includes a beehive which is excellent for making people aware of the importance of bees. A camera to be placed next to the beehive to record their activity would further develop the work they are doing in this respect. Some additional bee suits would enable participants on the course to experience the beehives close.</p> <p>The group would like to run 12 x 4-hour sessions to encourage additional people other than those who attend the Centre to join in gardening and cookery sessions, utilising vegetables/fruit grown in the LYCC garden promoted via their foodbank.</p> <p>In addition, they run a Getaway After School Club for children aged 9+ and Youth Club for young people aged 11+. They would use the extra equipment with them to encourage them to be involved with growing edibles and</p>

	<p>cooking them afterwards and thereby influencing their families. The group work with 95 children and young people in the Centre.</p> <p>The addition of a greenhouse would make it possible to plant seeds in the autumn and then plant out in the spring. It could also be used to over-winter plants. It would be an excellent resource to encourage people to see gardening as an all-year round activity.</p>

A newly opened restaurant in Llandovery which is owned by an investment company heard of the good work undertaken by the Centre and now provides food worth £1,500 each month to add to the foodbank.</p>

Project Description	<p>The organisation has independently, and in collaboration, run various schemes in the past to support food poverty in the area. Collectively they have observed key issues in the schemes and projects they have previously run and created a suitable strategy.</p>

	<p>The aim of this strategy is to firstly tackle the lack of representation in local and healthy food within the food bank/low-income supply chain. Key elements of the strategy are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - To take local surplus and donated food and turn it into accessible ready meals. - Start the roll-out of already created community food education programme. - Create bulk set meals weekly of nutritious and healthy ready meals as access points. <p>Meals will be easily available from non-stigmatised, normalised environments such as Nurture’s Café. Revenue from this will enable further investment and sustainability. Meals will also be available by a community freezer accessible by all. These meals will be accessible and free for all those in need, operating with a pay-as-you can system like the above cafe meals, utilising the both local food and fresh food surplus extending the shelf-life to 3 months and distributed across 6 food banks/hubs in the county.</p> <p>Community food education will be available to both the target end user and community leads, with subscriptions available to cooking classes as well as a weekly veg box. There will also be a chance to volunteer in a meal prep kitchen and develop skills related to food sourcing and recipe development.</p>

Project Description	<p>The centre aims to inspire an intergenerational group and their Junior and Youth clubs, to develop a grow space in the garden of the Family centre.</p> <p>The group will also work with Llanelli Men's Sheds to build themselves and the Family Centre a raised planting bed each (under 18's will have 'flat packs' to construct at the Centre) and then they will learn how to grow vegetables, herbs, and fruits. They will gather seeds from their first crop to</p>

	<p>use in following years. They will be provided with lessons on nutrition, preparation and cooking of produce.</p> <p>Additionally, they will participate in inventive lessons that will excite and inspire, such as making tasty popcorn from their very own grown corn! The centre will choose a local 'grow space' in Carmarthenshire to visit for inspiration. Participants will eventually progress to grow produce at home and/or work on a plot in the local Dwyfor Allotment. They will learn how to plan tasks, produce, and work within a budget, and to build, grow and cook foods.</p> <p>They will encourage skills sharing by inviting local community volunteers to join the group and show participants how they grow. The participants will eventually be able to pass on the useful skills they have learnt to their family and friends.</p>
