Future sustainability will be supported by fundraising, donations and a food growing project.</p> <p>Amount requested: £3,500</p>	<p>CETMA are a large organisation which covers several villages/towns in one area: Pembrey, Burry Port, Pwll, Kidwelly, St Ishmaels, Five Road, Ponthenry, Pontyates.</p>	Cllr. HFPP-03	Pantry Cymunedol Cwmaman	Food Bank	The outcome of the project is to sustain and grow the positive impact of the Cwmaman Community Pantry and the Cwmaman Foodbank, with an emphasis on dignity and choice. Current membership: 77 adults and 34 children, with membership increasing weekly. Amount requested: £3,000	Stock is predominantly redistributed food through Fareshare and the Co-op which is received weekly. Stocks of perishable goods are low, even with the support from these groups.	Cllr. David Jenkins	£3,000
HFPP-04	Banc Bwyd CNE	Food Bank	A relatively new foodbank, which supported 71 adults and 65 children during 2021. The outcome of the project is to be able to support more families and individuals who fall into poverty. It is likely that donors will also experience financial constraints and may be forced to be less generous in future. Amount requested: £3,385.20	Although a relatively new foodbank it works closely with Banc Bwyd Llandysul. With foodbank use estimated to increase, it is important to support a rural community, which is situated away from the bigger towns.	Cllr. Hazel Evans	£1,000
HFPP-05	Llwynhendy Pemberton Forum	Food Bank	The outcomes of the project are to support the vulnerable, maintain health and wellbeing, provide healthy meals and offer practical advice for daily living. Currently supporting 100 people plus per month, with an increase expected in line with fuel cost increases and a cut in benefits. Amount requested: £3,500	The organisation also offers support by working with outside agencies, to offer advice on debt management, access to benefits etc.	Cllr. Fozia Akhtar	£3,500

HFPP-06	Llandovery Youth & Community Centre	Food Bank	<p>The outcomes of the project are to support those who encountered debt during the pandemic because of reduced working hours, those who are struggling to pay fuel bills and those who are self-employed who have been affected by the pandemic – focusing on the provision of food to those who really are in need.</p> <p>Currently supporting around 120 people per week, which is likely to increase in line with higher living costs.</p> <p>Amount requested: £3,500</p>	<p>Although supported by a local restaurant with weekly food provision, funding would allow for a more consistent approach to planning and support.</p> <p>Building on support from the local community, including donations from churches, individuals, will help with future sustainability of the provision.</p>	Cllr. HFPP-07	Myrtle Hill Food Bank	Food Bank	<p>The outcomes of the project are to provide people in crisis with 3 days' worth of non-perishable food, signposting individuals to additional support and inspiring change.</p> <p>The foodbank is consistently providing high numbers of food parcels to those in need in the community. The total number of people fed in the week commencing 31/1/22 was 98 individuals, in comparison to the same time last year when it was 44.</p> <p>Amount requested: £2,500</p>	<p>The number of people receiving support from the foodbank has doubled and is showing an increase in parcel distribution.
