Project Description/	Amman United is a well-established Community Rugby Club,
Community Benefit	unfortunately, they have been, without floodlights on the rugby field for the last 4 years, which were originally donated to the club from the opencast mine in Garnant, when they regenerated the area on completion of the extraction of coal. The lights have become unusable, due to age and a professional electrical company has confirmed replacement parts are no longer available, therefore, the floodlights are no longer fit for purpose.
	They have spent four winters without lights, both senior and junior teams, have been paying to travel and use other facilities, to train, and they are desperate to get the lights updated, so they can continue to use, the facilities, throughout the year.
	This project is to assist with new LED floodlights, to be erected on existing columns, no planning required, which they have secured funds of £26k. The new floodlights would enable them to build on current playing numbers, both at senior and Junior sections, also establishing a Youth side.
	Within the junior section there are teams at, under 9s, 10s, 13s, and 14s, which means they are missing a massive gap of age groups, at 7s, 8s, 11s, 12s, 15s and 16s, this is something that they must build on for the benefits of the Community and the Club.
	They are currently building a new committee, as over the past 12 months, they have had many younger members join, who are working hard to change the way the Amman United Rugby Club, is perceived within the community.

	Through the COVID pandemic they opened the function room upstairs, on a Tuesday evening and delivered food, to the most vulnerable families within the community, also opened the facilities daily in the afternoons for packed lunches, with enormous success. They have opened the doors to the community, as a hub for people to drop off supplies and resources for a family whose house burnt down locally, along with Ukraine appeal, also they are continuing to run a drop off point for food parcels for a local food bank. During recent storms where most of the village were without electricity, they welcomed the community for hot drinks and provisions within the club, over the weekend period. The facility is open for the community to raise funds for McMillan, with regular coffee mornings and charity events.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	They have consulted with various groups within the community and externally, which has generated new younger committee members, over the past 12 months, who are working hard to change the way the Amman United Rugby Club, is perceived within the community, that they are in and represent. They are working closely, with the junior section members, who have already been working with Rob Venus on community projects and are excited and committed, to be looking at future projects and programmes that open the facilities, to the wider community. The rugby club facilities are situated in the centre of Golwg Yr Aman Park and feel that it is especially important to be part of the development of this beautiful area, new lights will do this and be used for years to come, and will be enjoyed by many generations of children, young people, and adults. The focus is on community involvement which will have a strong ethos of encouraging community participation and social inclusion,

can improve opportunities to meet others whilst learning new skills and gaining a sense of ownership in one's community.

Health

Over the pandemic period there is evidence that shows an increase in children, young people, and adults, suffering with mental health and wellbeing issues. As a club they hope to see a decrease in Mental Health and wellbeing issues, due to having the lights upgraded and being able to offer Training, being creative with different fun activities, playing rugby with friends, all year round, will give everyone more of a sense of purpose and a place within the community they live.

Education

Through playing sport and the physical activities, which will be provided, aiming to develop children, young people and adults, skills knowledge, and networks, to succeed at home, in the community and in their careers. As a club they aim to provide opportunities for people of all ages involved, to build on their core skills, levels of confidence, self-esteem, self-worth, character and to gain a better understanding of positive relationships with their peers and families.

Culture

This project does address culture, as they are giving young & disadvantaged people an outlet and keeping them out of trouble or rehabilitating young people who have been in trouble. Thus, creating a community-based culture in the Cwmamman Area. Additionally, The Amman has been at the heart of what people associate with the Cwmamman Area and brings its own cultural values to the Amman Valley Area.

Energy Efficiency /Sustainability.

Having the lights upgraded with LED light bulbs use around 85% less electricity than the normal incandescent bulbs and 50% less than fluorescent tubes. The efficiency of a light bulb is typically measured in lumens per watt, LEDs are better at efficient lighting because they provide higher lumens per watt than other types. The main advantage of upgrading, especially now when electricity bills

	have doubled, is the running costs will be significantly lower than traditional lighting, savings could be up to 90%.

It was set up to provide a focal point and venue for the community. The primary beneficiaries of the services available at the Centre are residents of the Upper Amman Valley. The Centre has an open-door policy and encourages people of all ages and abilities, also attracts visitors/tourists and businesses. This project is a result of review and evaluation of existing services and during our most recent public meeting with members of the community and Cwarter Bach Community Council, members expressed concerns about the air flow in our community Cafe. The main budgetary impact of the pandemic has been a reduction in income, but this is also intertwined with significantly less internal capacity and resources: 'The pandemic has been a disaster for the community centre, due to the loss of volunteers who assist with the day to day running of the organisation. Many of the members are elderly and are still worried about catching COVID. The Cafe is in the middle of the building therefore there is no ventilation. This project is to fund 2 air conditioning units which will create a safer environment for the community to enjoy all available facilities at the Centre, also to purchase a new commercial dishwasher, easing

Project Title	Brynamman Public Hall Stage Lighting System Upgrade
Applicant	Brynamman Public Hall & Institute

Project Description/ Community Benefit	The wide use of the stage has been the core of Brynamman Public Hall since the 1920s and has provided the community with a central hub of recreational activity for 100 years. The trustees wish to keep the stage up to a fully usable standard for the considerable number of schools, community groups and clubs that benefit from the facility. To do this, an overhaul and upgrade to the stage lighting system needs to take place.
	Adaptations and upgrades need to be put in place to secure the usability and longevity of this vital facility in the future. The Trustees also recognise that putting on live performances at the Hall is not an easy task due to the outdated facilities. Only very few staff members are trained to manipulate and operate the current equipment, and often more modern equipment needs to be sourced from outside, such as paying to hire equipment for a particular performance from an equipment rental company. Keeping the venue in line with expected performance equipment specification will also make the Hall more attractive to outside touring companies. Shows that are brought from outside the community to the Hall offer a chance for the community of Brynamman and the surrounding villages to enjoy entertainment right on their doorstep at a fraction of the cost of travelling to a town or city and visiting a larger venue.
	 The grant funding will be spent in three ways as part of this project: The purchase of new stage lighting equipment to be installed within the Public Hall, including electrical cabling and accessories, internally wired bars for the safe rigging of lights, and a package of modern, energy efficient LED stage lighting fixtures. The professional installation of the above equipment. Existing equipment and infrastructure will need to be removed and/or modified to accommodate the new equipment. Some minor structural work to the stage rigging area and a significant amount of electrical work will be undertaken as part of the project. The provisioning and testing of the new installation and equipment by a professional theatrical equipment installation and testing company.
	The project will see the installation of industry standard equipment and systems, which will enhance the current usability of the stage, but also future proof the venue for many years to come. Creating a solid foundation for a range of stage lighting equipment and adaptation is at the forefront of the planning process. The project will create a far more sustainable approach to live events at the

	hall, and the application has demonstrated great awareness of this by looking to source the installation of a system built entirely around the use of LED fixtures, disregarding the need of older and outdated technologies that are not as flexible or energy efficient. The project will also have a huge focus on recycling. Most materials removed will be recycled or reused. This project will ensure that opportunities for employment, training and community benefit will continue in this form at the venue. These opportunities will also expand after the project is complete.

Evidence of Need / Community Engagement	Brynamman Public Cinema is the only venue of its kind in the area. Venues that survived demolition slightly further afield such as Pontardawe Arts Centre and Ammanford Miners Theatre are both examples of venues that were closed for an exceptionally lengthy period, and reopened years later after full refurbishment. Brynamman never once closed, and still to this day is completely independent and run by the committee of trustees who are descendants of the many ex miners and people of the community that helped to run the hall for the last century. For the Public Hall to be able to offer the stage as a facility, upgrades to this system need to be put in place. This will ensure that the Hall remains an attractive venue for touring companies, but it also means that the local groups and community who benefit from the stage facilities will have access to modern equipment which will increase training opportunities and broaden the potential for performing arts at the venue.
Contributing to the themes of the Fund	Recreation & Culture This project will further secure Brynamman Public Hall as a centre for recreation and culture, for which it was built by subscription from miner's wages in an era when the area was industrial and there

was significant deprivation. There is still deprivation, but the Hall continues to serve the people of the valley and beyond, capturing the cultural essence of so many local people who worked in, for or around the pits in the valley and to enshrine them within a building that has been the focus of their entertainment, rest, and recreation for the last century.

This project seeks to capture the effect the Institute had on people's lives and be a cultural resource for future generations. The equipment installed as part of this project will significantly enhance and modernise a vital community facility, enabling the provision of performing arts and recreational performance activities to continue at the venue.

The Hall provides a venue for live entertainment which cannot be accommodated on this scale anywhere, at a rate that can be afforded by everyone, or even donated free of charge. It has and will continue to have a fully functional, professional stage for live performance of all kinds that must be kept up to date and to fully usable standard.

Environmental Sustainability

This project will ensure the operation of stage facilities in an environmentally friendly way, by choosing to convert to an LED based system, as opposed to the more traditional theatrical incandescent fixtures, a significant amount of electricity is saved. Fewer fixtures are also needed to create a similar effect, as LED fixtures can contain hundreds of colours, versus traditional lanterns which tend to have one or very few colours. The total power draw saving of the lighting system on a typical live show will be up to 75%.

The project will also have a huge focus on recycling. Most materials removed will be recycled or reused. A lot of the cabling removed will be kept as stock to make trailing cable for other projects. The lanterns removed will also not be thrown away. There is a market for lots of the retro lighting fixtures that are currently installed, and whilst they are no longer suitable for mainstream use, there are retro themed clubs and venues or even antiques collectors who would be interested in obtaining the equipment to upcycle. It will not go to waste.

The old lighting bars and steel rope, brackets and accessories will be given away locally. There will be next to zero waste from the old equipment being removed.

Roles and All team members at the Public Hall are playing a key role in the responsibilities within project. When the project was first envisioned back in 2019, a organisation meeting was held to discuss in depth the requirements for the new installation. One thing that shone out was the new system needs to be easier to use and maintain. The Public Hall sees a fast turnaround in volunteers through the volunteering program. With an 'all first-hand deck' approach for everyone who joins, the systems in place need to be easy to manage, safe, and quick to learn. It is evident that when this project is a success, the simpler usability of the system alone will be of huge benefit to everyone involved. Tom Smith will be overseeing the project as project manager. With a background in technical theatre and 12 years at the Public Hall, who understands the complexities involved with a project of this scale for live performance. Mapping of service/ Brynamman Public Cinema is the only venue of its kind in the area. facility within the area The Hall has strong relationships with numerous members of the community who rely on the facilities available at the venue. Examples of current groups are Cylch Meithrin, Brynamman Primary School, Ammanford Community Theatre, Amman Valley School of Dance, and the halls Volunteering Programme. **Future Sustainability** This project will create a far more sustainable approach to live events

at the hall. With the current outdated facilities, it has already been proving difficult for several years to successfully operate and use the existing equipment. There is no option to further carry the use of this equipment into the future. By installing a new system, with specific focus on future proofing electrical and physical infrastructure, the stage will be equipped to serve the needs of crew and performers for years to come. The evolution in theatre technology was rapid during the 20th century, and it continued to rapidly evolve well into the 2000s with the improving energy efficient LED technology. This project will see the installation of a system built entirely around the use of LED fixtures, disregarding the need of older and outdated technologies that are not as flexible or energy efficient. Full LED installations are at the forefront, and by installing a system of this type, there is a guarantee that the infrastructure and equipment will remain relevant and practical throughout its usable lifespan. It will be the backbone of the live performance facilities at the Public Hall for years to come.

The equipment and infrastructure that is being installed will require general maintenance on a regular basis going forward. Most of this maintenance can be done by in house team members who are technically trained. This will include standard practices such as visual inspections and PAT testing, but also regular cleaning and maintenance of the lighting instruments. The motors and winches for lowering and raising the on-stage lighting bars will be inspected annually by a qualified company.

Monitoring and Evaluation of outputs	The project will be an enormous success for all involved in live stage show activities at the hall. This will be monitored continuously through active use of the stage and facilities, training, and performances. With the huge upgrade planned, completion of the project will feel revolutionary for those who are accustomed to the older equipment. There will be far more time to focus on what matters when a lot of the challenging work and worry is taken out of planning a show. We believe this will become clear as soon as the facilities begin seeing use.
Business Plan/Officer Comments	Upon completion of the project, the Public Hall will be fully equipped with an up to date, industry standard, energy efficient stage lighting system. The group have addressed how the equipment and infrastructure that is being installed will require general maintenance on a regular basis going forward.
	In terms of potential growth, renewing the staging area will allow the hall to explore more live programming opportunities with the aim of increasing the number of live performances. Also, with the potential of more shows, this could be of financial benefit to the Hall for increasing the opportunity for charitable and donated stage use. The outcomes of the project will engage with a mixture of employees, trustees, and volunteers. The volunteering programme is incredibly successful at the hall, and this will only enhance the opportunities they can provide.

Project Description/ Community Benefit	Caerbryn Welfare Association was formed over 75 years ago holding their first meeting in a red shed, shed goch colliery building, but with grant monies received 20 years ago, topping £130,000 the surrounding land and red shed site has evolved to become a recreation park with a modern welfare hall, used daily and professionally managed and run for over 20 years, self-sustaining, requiring extremely limited grant funds.
	Regular groups facilitate the hall, such as WI sewing group on Wednesdays, Kick boxing on Thursdays, Llandybie Choir on Wednesdays, Yoga on Mondays, and Spiritualist group on Thursdays, also spectators watching regular football matches from the rear of the hall. There are also birthday parties at weekends and recently there was an extraordinarily successful Jubilee party.
	The play equipment and the decking has come to the end of its life and is unsafe, this project is to re-develop the play area and upgrade the current unsafe wooden decking area, with replacement composite decking.
	The decking is around 50ft x 15ft, an extensive additional space for the hall activities, due to being a vast outdoor recreational space, which until recently, due to not being fit for purpose, was a well-used part of the facility, especially during summer months and when COVID restrictions were lifted, and in the interests of health and safety, urgently needs to be replaced.
